
PROMISES

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE


I know people who read the ending of a book before they are finished with it. I could never do that! I have to follow the story in every detail until the final page. When it comes to the story of our salvation history, however, we get to do a little of both: we know the end of the story in terms of Revelation and God's desire for us to live with him in eternity. We know of the heavenly kingdom to which we have been invited and in which we live. What we don't know is all the details that get us to our own, individual, final page in the great drama of our response to the gift of salvation. In the first reading today, we hear the story of the fall of humankind - about how our earliest parents rejected God's command and gave into temptation. However, the story doesn't end there. Adam and Eve may have been sent out of the Garden of Eden, but God didn't give up on them - or us. Instead, he sent a long line of prophets who paved the way for his Son, Jesus. With Jesus' sacrifice on the cross, the gates of heaven were opened so all have the opportunity to accept the gift of salvation. As St. Paul writes in his Letter to the Corinthians, we can know "that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Paul's words give us great hope and encouragement, for we all know that living as God commands can be difficult. We are assured, however, that grace and strength are ours if we only ask the Holy Spirit for guidance. As Christians, we are part of the body of Christ and a community of believers. In today's Gospel, Jesus notes that a house divided against itself cannot stand. That's a reminder that we are all in this together. We need one another – and the grace of God – to bring us to everlasting life in heaven. In the Gospel Jesus asked, "Who are my mother and my brothers?" And we heard the answer: those who do the will of God. Let us open our hearts today to receive the promptings and grace of God, so we may follow him to the best of our ability each day. The story of salvation is our story, and we know what the ending is meant to be.

PRAY As members of the body of Christ, perhaps there are ways this week we could be praying alongside our brothers and sisters in our church or community. In addition to Mass, consider Eucharistic Adoration or a prayer group. Reflect on how God might be nudging your heart.



Life of Stewardship

In today's First Reading from the Book of Genesis we hear the story of Adam and Eve and their sins, defying God. However, when God was present in the garden, the man and woman hid themselves. Adam responds to God's question why in part by saying "I was afraid... so I hid myself." Did he, do any of us really think he could hide from God?

As children many of us may have hidden from a parent when we did something wrong, and it was in violation of some specific order we had received. Our efforts to hide what we did and to hide ourselves were probably no more effective than Adam's.

As humans we know the temptation of following our own plans, even if they are contrary to God's. We think we know better, and we may try to still have it our way. If what we have done is particularly shameful, we may try to hide our sins from God.

The sincere truth is that we cannot hide from God any more than Adam and Eve could. Psalm 139 declares, "Where can I hide from your spirit (God's)? From your presence where can I flee? If I ascend to the heavens, you are there; if I lie down in Sheol (the place of the dead) you are there, too. If I say, 'Surely darkness will hide me'... Darkness is not dark for you."

What are we hiding from? In recent weeks we have learned over and over how much God loves us. It is time for us to accept that and not hide. - Stewardship Reflections by Catholic Stewardship

Grief Recovery Method Program - Classes Offered June 12 - July 31

The Grief Recovery Method program provides a safe environment for you to look at your old beliefs about dealing with loss, which losses continue to affect your life, and take actions that will lead you to complete unresolved emotions that may still be causing you pain. It's an action based group, involves reading and writing assignments outlined in *The Grief Recovery Hand-book – 20th Anniversary Expanded Edition* (book provided). This program is NOT a drop-in group, registered participants meet for 8 weekly sessions. You will learn actions that help, and you will choose what loss you want to focus upon. The Grief Recovery Method is a scientifically tested Evidence-Based Program that provides anyone coping with emotional pain from loss, with an effective method to help them heal, whether the loss was recent or in the past. There is **no cost for this pro-**

gram, but it does require commitment to recover from unresolved loss. Facilitated by Suzanne Zaw, Certified Grief Recovery Specialist, the 8-week program will begin **Wednesdays**, **June 12 until July 31, 2024, 10am -12noon** at St. Michael's. Tenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus asks us a stunning question this week: "How can Satan cast out Satan?" To enter into this question opens up the often hidden dynamics of what Jesus has done and is constantly doing. If we're honest, our response to some degree is: "How else can we cast him out? Satan is precisely how we cast out Satan!" But Jesus wants us to see this finally does not work. Here's what I mean.

Satanas names the demonic mechanism by which we render wholeness through accusation. When we face a threat, we seek something to protect us (e.g., more money, social status, security, power, etc.). Rivals inevitably arise for these things and so do tensions. Accusation presents itself. "I'll never be successful unless I get ahead of that guy." "She's already trying to get ahead of me." "That group of immigrants is trying to take our jobs." And so on. The accusation grows into a fear inducing threat - things will break apart - no, they already are! Hurry! We inflict violence on the victim and - as if by magic - peace ensues. For a time. Soon fresh accusations are required to hold new chaos at bay, until there is no

community left at all. This is essentially humankind's sad history in a nutshell.

Jesus' cross and resurrection unmasks this broken system of "casting out Satan by Satan" and ushers in a new one he calls "the Kingdom of God." He reveals that the dynamic of accusation is nothing compared to his power of divine mercy and love. The cross (and not Satan) is the real power to tear down strongholds of sin and cast out Satan. This is why he describes himself as the "stronger man who ties up the strong man to plunder his house." This week let's notice the ways we "cast out Satan by Satan," and then refuse to do it anymore. Because in the long run, that divided house cannot stand.

Treasures From Our Tradition

The cathedral is a treasure in a diocese and in our tradition. It is not simply a "big church," as some say; some pa-rish churches are larger. What makes a cathedral is the presence of the chair, called a *cathedra* (Latin for seat) reserved for the Bishop.

There are many instances in our country of a local church (diocese) outgrowing a cathedral. In Baltimore and St. Louis, the former cathedrals are historic treasures in the heart of the old city, but new and larger structures now function as the seat of the Bishop.

When a Bishop dies or retires, it is said that "the seat is vacant," and when the new bishop is installed, the central ritual is the moment when the decree of the Holy Father is read and the new Bishop is escorted to the *cathedra*. No one but the Bishop sits in the *cathedra* during a ritual, but in Los Angeles the *cathedra* in the Cathedral of Our Lady of the Angels is accessible, and no one seems to mind when a visitor tries the *cathedra* out for the Bishop's point of view. - Rev. Everyday Stewardship - One Body Working for Christ

I have coached all three of my children in soccer at some time in their lives. I loved teaching them and their teammates the importance of functioning as one unit. If we were not all moving together toward victory, we would all find ourselves together in defeat. We used to go through one drill I called the "human foosball." We would scrimmage with players in lines like on a foosball table. If you ever got too far behind or too far ahead of those in your line, play would stop and the ball would go to the other team. The goal was to help build an awareness of where your teammates were on the pitch and to teach the lesson that no one player is a team onto themselves.

As disciples and stewards, we sometimes find ourselves far behind or maybe even too far ahead. As a consequence, our actions either hinder the ability of the Body of Christ to evangelize and pass on the faith to a new generation or present the Church as an entity that sees itself as judgmental or too holy to be in the world. We are called to community, and in that community, we must be aware of our brothers and sisters in the faith. At times, we need to help them grow in their faith. Other times, we need to slow down and realize that we cannot

Recognize God in Your Ordinary Moments - In the Family Way

Look here: there is no one more family oriented than me. I drive a minivan. I wear mom jeans. I wipe unidentified gunk off of kids' faces without a second thought.

I'm all about family, but I'm not always a fan of what "family" has come to mean in the modern lexicon. Family values. Family friendly. Family-oriented. It's usually a synonym for "non-offensive." Soft. Moderate. Nice.

It's all fine, I suppose. But is it genuine? Creating a family, bringing that family physically into the world, was the hardest and most painful thing I ever did. The care and keeping of that family - the teamwork with my spouse, the feeding and watering of the children, the teaching of the writing and the reading the and praying - it's very hardcore. It's not all stuffed animals and peekaboo. It's a mental, spiritual, and physical challenge that daily brings me to my knees.

I'm not even talking exclusively about parenting young children. I'm talking about being part of a family in any way - being a son, being a daughter, being a sister and cousin and uncle. Families are complicated and strange and messy. Sometimes boundaries need to be drawn, or they need to be crossed. Sometimes walls need to be put up or torn down. It's never easy. It's never simple.

But I've never known someone who didn't want to be part of a family in some way, whether that's a blood family or one created by circumstance. And there's a reason Christ creates a family ("Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother") and not a club.

A family is a crucible, yes - but what comes out is so much more beautiful than what went in. For all the effort and even pain that is sometimes involved in a family relationship, there is nothing more defining, more fulfilling.

We are part of Christ's family, and what we can expect from that is certainly not a life of simple, clear cut, undemanding discipleship. We can expect confusion. We can expect discomfort. But we can expect to be perpetually drawn to the heart of one who loves us without hesitation, without condition. In the end, we're family. - Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman, ©LPi

Was He Crazy?

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Genesis 3:9-15 The fall
- ► 2 Corinthians 4:13-5:1 Paradox of the ministry
- ► Mark 3:20-35 Jesus and Beelzebub; Jesus and his family

All three readings today speak to the reality of our imperfect world. The first reading contains the Jewish answer to the question of why we aren't living in a perfect Garden of Eden. The second reading from St. Paul is a reflection on the reality of discouragement, physical deterioration, and afflictions in this lifetime as we hope for something better. Mark's Gospel reading gives us a glimpse into the sometimes chaotic scenes involving Jesus, especially when people (his family, even!) don't understand him.

Mark tells us bluntly that Jesus' relatives tried to reign him in because they thought "He is out of his mind."

"Why would they have thought that?" we might wonder. Because besides healing people, feeding thousands,

casting out demons, and teaching, Jesus also riled up the religious leaders and accused them of abusing their positions of authority. He threatened the Roman rule by attracting crowds who identified *him*, not Caesar, as the Son of God. He was even dissuading tax collectors from collecting tax money that the Jews owed to the Romans (Mk 2:13-14)! His speeches were creating general unrest and disturbance on many levels of society.

Jesus' family would have realized that speaking the truth to power could get

him killed. Martin Luther King, Jr., Mahatma Gandhi, and Oscar Romero are well-known examples of such a danger.

Would you be able to stand by and watch if your relative was doing and saying things in public that endangered him?
Wouldn't you want to stop him too?

Questions of the Week

What is your reaction to this scene when Jesus' family arrives to confront him?

What challenges might Jesus raise to people in positions of leadership and authority today that could be dangerous to his life?
